# **BIRDS**

#### **GAVIIDAE**

- 1. Pacific Loon Gavia pacifica At least 10 during Monterey Pelagic, Oct 8.
- 2. **Common Loon** *Gavia immer* As previous species.

#### **PODICEPIDAE**

- 3. **Western Grebe** *Aechmophorus occidentalis* A few distant birds during pelagic and from beach at Asilomar.
- 4. **Eared Grebe** *Podiceps nigricollis* Nice views of a single bird at Moss Landing.



# **PROCELLARIIDAE**

- 5. **Northern (Southern) Fulmar** *Fulmarus glacialis rodgersii* Three single birds during the pelagic. Pacific or Rodger's Fulmar is potential split from Norther Fulmar (<a href="www.wordbirdnames.org">www.wordbirdnames.org</a>; version 7.3).
- 6. **Buller's Shearwater** *Puffinus bulleri* At least 30 birds during the pelagic.
- 7. **Sooty Shearwater** *Puffinus griseus* The most common Shearwater, at least 500+.
- 8. Short-tailed Shearwater Puffinus tenuirostris A single bird seen well during the pelagic.
- 9. **Pink-footed Shearwater** *Puffinus creatopus* The second most common Shearwater, at least 200.
- 10. Flesh-footed Shearwater Puffinus carneipes Two single birds during the pelagic.

#### **PELECANIDAE**

11. **Brown Pelican** *Pelecanus occidentalis* – Common during pelagic and at Asilomar.

# **PHALACROCORACIDAE**

12. Brandt's Cormorant Phalacrocorax penicillatus – A flock seen during the pelagic.

13. Pelagic Cromorant Phalacrocorax pelagicus – Common at Asilomar and during pelagic.



#### **ARDEIDAE**

14. Great Blue Heron Ardea herodias – Various birds seen at Monterey and at Moss Landing.



- 15. Great Egret Ardea alba Seen at Moss Landing
- 16. Snowy Egret Ardea thula Various birds at Monterey and at Moss Landing.

# **ANATIDAE**

- 17. **Greater White-fronted Goose** *Anser albifrons* A flock of at least 30 birds seen during the pelagic.
- 18. **Cackling Goose** *Branta hutchinsii* Split from **Canada Goose** *Branta canadensis* (hutchinsii) As previous species.
- 19. **Mallard** *Anas platyrhynchos* Four birds at Moss Landing. Surprisingly, the only species of duck seen during the trip.

# **ACCIPITRIDAE**

20. Cooper's Hawk Accipiter cooperii – A single bird seen at the conference grounds of Asilomar.

- 21. **Sharp-shinned Hawk** *Accipiter striatus* A single perched female seen well at Asilomar.
- 22. **Red-tailed Hawk** *Buteo jamaicensis* Common roadside bird.

#### **CATHARTIDAE**

23. **Turkey Vulture** *Cathartes aura* – Common and widespread.

# **FALCONIDAE**

24. Peregrine Falco peregrinus – Two brids seen, one at Monterey and one during the pelagic.

#### **CHARACRIIDAE**

- 25. Black-bellied Plover Pluvialis squatarola A single bird seen at Moss Landing.
- 26. American Golden-Plover Pluvialis dominica Several small perched flocks at Asilomar.



27. **Snowy Plover** Charadrius alexandrinus – A single bird at Moss Landing (beach).

# **HAEMATOPODIDAE**

28. **Black Oystercatcher** *Haematopus bachmani* – A pair seen during the pelagic and a pair at Asilomar.

# **SCOLOPACIDAE**

- 29. Whimbrel Numenius phaeopus Common at Asilomar.
- 30. **Long-billed Curlew** *Numenius americanus* A single bird at Moss Landing.
- 31. Marbled Godwit Limosa fedoa Common at Moss Landing.
- 32. Willet Catoptrophorus semipalmatus Common at Asilomar and at Moss Landing.
- 33. Surfbird Aphriza virgata At least four birds at Asilomar.
- 34. **Ruddy Turnstone** *Arenaria interpres* A single bird at Asilomar.
- 35. Black Turnstone Arenaria melanocephala Common at Asilomar.
- 36. Sanderling Calidris alba As previous species.
- 37. **Least Sandpiper** *Calidris minutilla* Common at Moss Landing.

- 39. **South Polar Skua** *Stercorarius maccormicki* Two birds seen, one seen well, during the pelagic.
- 40. **Pomarine Jaeger** *Stercorarius pomarinus* At least ten birds during the pelagic.
- 41. **Parasitic Jaeger** *Stercorarius parasiticus* As previous species.
- 42. California Gull Larus californicus Common.
- 43. Western Gull Larus occidentalis Common.
- 44. Heermann's Gull Larus heermanni Common.
- 45. Elegant Tern Sterna elegans Common.
- 46. **Common Tern** *Sterna hirundo* A single bird seen during the pelagic.

47. Foster's Tern Sterna fosteri – A single bird at Moss Landing.

# **ALCIDAE**

- 48. **Common Murre** *Uria aalge* Common during the pelagic.
- 49. **Rhinoceros Auklet** *Ceorhinca monocerata* As previous species.
- 50. **Tufted Puffin** Fratercula cirrhata A few birds seen in non-breeding plumage.

#### **COLUMBIDAE**

- 51. Rock (Feral) Pigeon Columba livia A few roadside birds seen while driving. Introduced.
- 52. **Eurasian Collared Dove** *Streptopelia decaocto* A single bird at Asilomar.

#### **ALCIDINIDAE**

53. **Belted Kingfisher** *Ceryle alcyon* – A single bird at the harbor of Monterey while waiting for departure of the pelagic.

#### **PICIDAE**

54. **Acorn Woodpecker** *Melanerpes formicivorus* – Common at Asilomar.

# **TYRANNIDAE**

- 55. **Black Phoebe** *Sayornis nigricans* Common at Asilomar.
- 56. **Say's Phoebe** *Sayornis saya* A single bird seen in the dunes at Asilomar.

# LANIIDAE

57. Loggerhead Shrike Lanius Iudovicianus – A single bird on the telephone wires, Santa Cruz.

#### **CORVIDAE**

- 58. **Western Scrub-Jay** *Aphelocoma clifornica* Various birds seen at Asilomar.
- 59. **American Crow** *Corvus brachyrhynchos* Common at Asilomar.

#### **AEGITHALIDAE**

60. **Bushtit** *Psaltriparus minimus* – A small flock seen upon arrival at Asilomar.

#### **SITTIDAE**

61. **Red-breasted Nuthatch** *Sitta canadensis* – A single bird at Santa Cruz.

#### TROGLODYTIDAE

62. **House Wren** *Troglodytes aedon* – A single bird at Asilomar.

# **MIMIDAE**

63. **Northern Mockingbird** *Mimus polyglottos* – As previous species.

# STURNIDAE

64. **European Starling** *Sturnus vulgaris* – Common. Introduced.

# **PARULIDAE**

- 65. **Townsend's Warbler** *Dendroica townsendi* Great views of a female at Asilomar.
- 66. Yellow-rumped Warbler Dendroica coronata At least three birds seen at Asilomar.

# **EMBERIZIDAE**

- 67. **California Towhee** *Pipilo crissalis* A single bird seen at Asilomar.
- 68. White-crowned Sparrow Zonotrichia leucophrys Common at Asilomar.
- 69. **Lapland Longspur** *Calcarius lapponicus* A single female seen well during the pelagic.

# **ICTERIDAE**

70. **Brewer's Blackbird** *Euphagus cyanocephalus* – Common.

# **MAMMALS**

**Harbor Seal** *Phoca vitulina* – Seen at Monterey in low numbers.

California Sea Lion Zalophus californianus – Common at Monterey and during pelagic.

**Mule (Blacktail) Deer** *Odocoileus hemionus* – Male and at least one female at the conference grounds, Asilomar.

**Humpback Whale** *Megaptera novaeangliae* – About ten seen during the pelagic, one (distant) breaching.

**Sea Otter** *Enhydra lutris* – Common at Asilomar (see page 2 for picture), superb views at Moss Landing.
